The TCBA Board of Directors met at the Foster Community Center on September 6, 2005. Also present were club members Lee Adair, Katie Donnelly, Dick Janson, Val Riggs, Bill Savage, Dwayne Scheidler, and Al Simons.

Discussion Items/Announcements

Arnie reported for Sue Viele that plans for the Christmas/Holiday Party have been made. This will be an adult only event and be held at the English Inn in Eaton Rapids.

Arnie also reported that Doug Waldo from Boyne Falls road across the U.S. this year and has volunteered to make a presentation at our November club meeting. Roger Nelson was previous scheduled but has agreed to postpone his presentation on his trip to "Ride the Rockies."

Darryl provided a brief review of tentative plans for the 2006 DALMAC Bridge Crossing. While the crossing will still occur, it will be held on Sunday morning and the logistics of the ride will need to be modified to accommodate that time. A statement has been posted on the DALMAC web site and will also appear in the October Chainwheel Chatter.

Bill Savage was introduced as the new volunteer to Chair the Safety & Education committee. Bill presented his outline of goals for the committee which will be on file with the minutes from the meeting and will also appear in the October Chainwheel Chatter.

Dick Jansen reported that all of the Crosstown Maps have been distributed and that he has requests that he can not fill. He will be contacting some of the other locations to see if they can return a few from their supply so he can fill more orders. A reprint is being planned but not before some corrections and changes are made.

Action items

Minutes of the July meeting were approved as submitted. Treasurer, Ron Claflin, presented a financial report through Sept. 6, 2005. The report was approved.

It was decided that when the Chainwheel Chatter is ready for publication it will be forwarded to the webmaster for posting on the web site in the same .pdf format that we have been using. It was agreen that since the monthly recurring ride schedule is already included in the Chainwheel Chatter there is no need for the information to be posted elsewhere on the web site. A link from the Ridelist (daily rides) to the Chainwheel Chatter, or a statement on the Ridelist page directing members to the Chainwheel Chatter for a schedule of recurring rides should be adequate for members to obtain the information. This will eliminate a duplication of efforts, the chance for discrepancies in having the ride schedule in two different places and can be done without TCBA incurring additional costs.

A request for funding from Share-a-Bike was reviewed and it was determined that more information was needed before a decision could be made. Arnie will invite someone from Share-a-Bike to attend the next board meeting to provide the information.

Bicycle Safety & Education Committee

The Bicycle Safety and Education Committee is being reformed after a two year absence. The current committee members are Bob Barrie, Lenny Provencher, Jeff Short, Gary Riggs, Val Riggs and Bill Savage.

The goals of the committee are as follows:

- Support the certification of League Cycling Instructors (LCI's). A three-day course is being held in Ann Arbor, September 9-11. Any League member who has taken "Road I" and is an experienced cyclist is eligible. LCI's can teach Road I, Road II, and other league courses.
- 2. Promote Bicycle Leagues "Road I" classes in the Lansing area.
- School Programs Visit classrooms (preferably 3rd Grade), show bicycle safety video, and discuss bicycle safety.
- 4. Promote walking and bicycle riding to school.
- 5. Produce weekly articles, during the spring and summer months, for area newspapers (preferably the Lansing State Journal), to promote bicycle riding and safe riding practices.

The committee will meet at 6:30 pm, just prior to every TCBA meeting, at the Foster Community Center. E A S Y S P O K E N History Repeats Itself

It's been several months since my last column. I have believed I should only have a column when I have something to say. Now I believe there are enough new members that I can draw from past articles and still be helpful.

DALMAC is over. Some of you rode up the Wall, others were pedestrians. I've done it both ways.

Officially, the "Wall" is a two-mile stretch going north out of East Jordan. Some may want to only include the last quarter mile, but I don't, and here is why. Using an Inclinometer, I measured the percent of grade along the way.

In town, you start a gentle 2% climb. Less than a half mile later, you have ridden an S-curve and the climb is twice as steep. In the next third of a mile, it looks like there is a slight downhill. If you stop pedaling, you can't coast; you are still on a 1% upgrade, then get back up to 4%.

Finally, there is visible relief ahead - a good half mile of downhill is in sight. Gotsha again. It is still 4% going up. No coasting allowed.

You see the "Steep Hill" sign ahead with the road going down (not). It is just not as steep at 3.5%.

Now, you're trying to get over your shock at seeing the start of the last quarter mile, and have made it half way to where it climbs to the clouds. Although it looks relatively level, you are already climbing an 8% grade.

Just before you notice a need for a large increase in effort, the road is already 10%. The steepest grade in the Tri-County area is a block-long 10% hill in Mason. You haven't started the tougher part yet, and the worst is still out of sight around the curve.

The measurements, in 100-foot (5 car length) increments are: 13%, 15%, 16%, starting curve, 17%, 18%, 17%, 15%, 10%, 0%.

During this stretch, I stopped riding at each point before the last quarter mile to take a reading, and pushed Sarah up the remainder. Here is a reprint from my July 1988 column:

Many runners set goals for themselves. Very few (and none of them sane) expect to cover ten feet with each step or maintain a pace of 160 steps a minute. For a runner, this is only expected from a cartoon character. Yet, put them on a bicycle and they can do it sitting down!

Ride a 1-mile race with yourself where only one factor is different: You put two 5-inch pencil-horns on your helmet. The devil in you would finish more than 10 feet behind. Without getting windy about it, imagine what a drag it is to be sitting up or wearing a baggy jacket!

The nose of the saddle is a handy place to store a cover in case of rain. It will keep the cover dry.

One effective trick to control vibration on fast downhills is to hold a thigh against the top tube. This damps the vibration, effectively diminishing the tendency of the frame to resonate out of control.

Half of all the parts of a typical bicycle are in the chain.

The tension-spoked "wire" wheel, usually called a bicycle wheel, was actually invented for aircraft, around 1850, on the premise that making them lighter would help them to eventually fly. And then, those bike guys, the Wrights, used a sled!

Hoffer and DALMAC Pave Shoulders

In June of 1997 at long-time TCBA member Hermon Hoffer's funeral Bob Gibbs, Tom Hardenbergh, Dick Allen and others discussed a fitting memorial to this extraordinary cyclist who was still riding 20 to 40 miles a day, even in the winter, at age 92. An annual ride, the Hermon Hoffer Harvest Adventure! (HHHA!) was begun as a fund raiser and the DALMAC Fund pledged a matching grant of \$5,000. As money slowly accumulated various projects were discussed. The first thought was a bronze sculpture of Hermon on a bicycle as a work of art and inspiration for all older cyclists. As time passed more practical projects were debated such as an interpretive rest stop on the Fred Meier Heartland Trail.

Early this summer an opportunity arose that struck the committee as a better idea. There has never (as DALMAC riders can attest) been a good cycle route between Ithaca and Alma, two communities in Hermon's home area. The two main paved roads, Luce and Alger, were both busy and lacked adequate shoulders. The Gratiot County Road Commission was planning its biggest project in recent history, the repaying of 15 miles of Ely Highway (including three miles of Luce) from Alma to Middleton. Local cyclists discussed including shoulders with Road Commission representatives but the additional cost was not in the county budget. After discussion a modified plan emerged. The county would pay for two miles and the Hoffer/DALMAC Funds for one and Luce could have shoulders from Alma to Tyler Rd which, with its lower traffic, is quite bikeable east for four miles to State Rd which has good shoulders to Ithaca. Current plans are to name this "Hermon's Way" with appropriate signage.

CPSC, World Wide Cycle Supply Inc. Announce Recall of Bicycles Sold at Toys "R" Us

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with the firm named below, today announced a voluntary recall of the following consumer product. Consumers should stop using recalled products immediately unless otherwise instructed.

Name of Product: Harley-Davidson 16-inch BMX Bicycles Units: About 25,000

Distributor: World Wide Cycle Supply Inc., of Islandia, N.Y.

Hazard: The fork that holds the front wheel can separate at the weld, causing the rider to fall and suffer injuries.

Incidents/Injuries: World Wide Cycle Supply Inc. has received 15 reports of fork welds breaking on these bicycles. There have been reports of six riders suffering injuries including injuries to the face, hands and mouth such as bruises, lacerations and lost teeth.

Description: The bicycle has a yellow and red painted flame pattern with a yellow fork and a sticker containing the words "Harley-Davidson" on the fork leg. Only bicycles with the following serial numbers are being recalled:
