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MINUTES OF THE TRI-COUNTY BICYCLE ASSOCIATION BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING Foster Community Center - Lansing April 5, 2011

Board members present included Roger Nelson, Ray Bailey, Steve Leiby, Linda Antinori, and Kris Stairs. Also present were club members Katie Donnelly, Wendell Proudfoot, Jeff Dillingham, Pat Harrington, Lenny Provencher, Janet Weber, and Jan Koller.

President Roger Nelson called the meeting to order at 6:30 p.m.

Added to the Agenda were Board Awards, trail rides, port-a-potty for Wednesday Alaeidon Township rides, and club membership in other bicycling associations.

Ray Bailey made a motion to approve the Agenda as amended, Steve Leiby seconded the motion and it passed unanimously.

Reports:

- <u>Minutes:</u> Secretary Linda Antinori presented March's Minutes to the Board for approval. Steve Leiby made a motion to accept the Minutes with a spelling correction. Ray Bailey seconded it, and the motion passed unanimously.

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BRANCHING OUT ITS AUTO ROOTS, MICHIGAN LOOKS TO ADD CROSS-STATE BIKE ROUTE

Michigan is already known for being the home of the automobile. Now, it's trying to add twowheelers to its image.

Michigan is trying to become the first state in 30 years to get a new U.S. Bike Route, which would add the state to a network of numbered interstate bicycle routes.

For example, Route 1 connects Virginia to North Carolina, and Route 76 spans from Virginia to Illinois.

The corridor designated as U.S. Bike Route 20 runs from Marine City on the east side of the sate to Ludington on the shore of Lake Michigan. The route, which awaits federal approval, also includes St. Clair, Marysville, North Branch, Bay City, Midland and Clare.

Scott Anderson, a volunteer for **Michigan Trails and Greenways Alliance**, has been working with the **Michigan Department of Transportation** on the project.

"We, from 2009 to 2010, have mapped out the route with the assistance and support of MDOT, the county road commissions and the communities along the route, Anderson said.

As of December, every local jurisdiction that owns any facility along the route has approved a resolution of support, he said.

"This combines three things," Anderson said of the bike route: "transportation, recreation and tourism.

"Transportation, because we are providing a signed route indicating how a bicyclist can travel from one community to another. Recreation, because it gives encouragement to people who might like to spend more time outdoors. And, of course, tourism is what is driving the whole thing."

Anderson estimates that it will cost less than \$150,000 for the route. The funding is for mapping and finding a way to promote and show the route on the Internet. Cities along the route are expected to pay for their portion.

In Wisconsin, studies found that \$564 million annually was brought into the state by out-ofstate bike tourists, said Ginny Sullivan, special-projects director for adventurecycling.com. That type of revenue could help many of the small communities along the route in Michigan, supporters say.

On May 2, MDOT will meet with the **American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials**, the organization responsible for route designation, to find out whether the project will be accepted. Route 20 eventually could extend as far as Eugene, Ore.

If the route is accepted, Anderson said, there will be a push to promote it through the Pure Michigan state advertising campaign — which, in turn, could bring more exposure to Route 20.

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BIKE, SCOOTER SALES PICK UP SPEED

As gas prices surge beyond \$4 a gallon, more Americans are cycling as a way to stay fit, save money, or both.

Sales of new bikes rose 9% in the first quarter of this compared with the vear. same period in 2010, and sales of road bikes - commonly used in commuting jumped 29%, says Scott Jaeger, senior retail analyst with Leisure Trends Group, a Boulder, Colo.-based retail tracking firm.

Sales of gas-powered scooters are up even more: nearly 50% in the first guarter compared with a year ago, says Motorcycle Industry the Council, a trade group.

"We see spikes when fuel prices rise," says Ty van Hooydonk, the group's spokesman. noting many scooters average 60 to 80 miles per gallon.

When gas prices last peaked Also driving bike use is the in the summer of 2008, Census data show bike commut-



ing rose 15% nationwide from 2007.

"We're starting to see the same thing playing out in 2011," says Andy Clarke, president of the League of American Bicyclists, a bike advocacy group.

"It's too early to say definitively that bike sales are up because of gas prices," says Tim Blumenthal, president of Peopleforbikes.org. He expects gas prices to escalate more and take bike sales along with them.

boom in bike trails and bikesharing programs, Blumenthal says, adding the federal government has made an unprecedented" \$2 billion investment in trails in the last two years.

Last year, Boston installed 20 miles of bike lanes and New York City added more than 50 miles, says the League of American Bicyclists, which designates 179 communities in 44 states as bike-friendly, up from 25 in 2003. It cites new bikesharing programs in Denver, Washington, D.C., and Minneapolis.

Regular riders tend to be low -income who cycle to save money or affluent who bike for fitness, Clarke says. Relatively few bike for environmental reasons, he says.

Upper-income leisure cyclists are unlikely to bike to work unless gas hits at least \$6 a gallon, says Jay Townley of the market research firm Gluskin-Townley Group.



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TCBA LOSES ANOTHER MEMBER

Bob Harrington died on Wednesday. May 4th at age 90. He is survived by his two sons, Mark and Jim.

I met Bob Harrington in 1973 when he came to some of the early TCBA meetings at Lansing Community College. Bob tended to position himself towards the back of the room but wasn't shy about his thoughts. He was one of the more senior members of the club. He'd fit in well today at a club meeting.

Bob came on the early rides with a three-speed, a Raleigh if my memory is correct. The bike made him stand out in the land of ten-speeds! The threespeed bike soon was traded in for to a ten-speed.

I think I can claim two contributions to Bob's riding:

- I urged him to wear a bicycle hel-٠ met. While he thought my Bell Biker was too heavy, the Skid Lid was better than nothing.
- And, alas, I taught him to spin. ٠ Why I ever did that I couldn't tell you. Bob went from being a strong rider to, well, damn near Super Man. Many people have memories of seeing Bob, pulling riders half his age into a rest stop, wearing his terry cloth shorts. So, he would ride you into the ground and reach for a cigarette. There always seemed to be something wrong with this picture. The Surgeon General never met Bob!

The terry cloth shorts gave way to riding The first ten-speed was reshorts. placed with his go fast bike, a RustOleum red custom built Assenmacher bicycle. Bob eventually did a little racing and held his own.

There was another bicycle side to Bob, the vellow tandem built by Matt Assenmacher. The tandem took Bob and Emily all over the country. There were several wintering trips to the Florida Keys. They camped six nights a week in a tent big enough for about half a person. The seventh night, Thursday I believe, was reserved for a hotel and NYPD Blue.

Bob's passion in life was photography. He would do almost anything for a good photo, from jumping out of an airplane during WWII in India to get a shot of soldiers parachuting, to a charging bull elephant in Africa. His favorite film color was black & white, and later it was also Kodachrome. (Get the music ready, a little Paul Simon is in order.)

My office wall has one of Bob's photos of a couple of Osprey he took while working for the DNR. The Osprey occasionally took offense at his being there.

Many club members have photos he took of them and of various wildlife.

His passion for photography and bicycling mixed well, most of the time. There was this one incident on a DALMAC, when a friend, who shall remain anonymous, decided to play a prank. Bob had one of those new-fangled tents that only used one or two stakes to hold it in place. Pull two stakes, slide a tent 50 feet, and have a little fun. We almost had a homicide! You just didn't mess with Bob's cameras.

You have to understand Bob grew up boxing and weight lifting.

If you work for DNR, you may want to skip the next couple of paragraphs.

Bob called me up one day in 1977, I believe, and said he was going to shoot the Ontonagon Boulder at Joe Louis arena. Would I like to come along? Why not, I didn't have anything better to do. Bob picked me up in his State car and we headed off to Detroit. We stopped in Novi for coffee and to meet a friend, and then off to Joe Louis. No rules broken here, of course.

When we arrived at the Joe, I saw a different side of Bob. Bob the professional photographer, all business. The Boulder is about the size of a two-drawer file cabinet. He surrounded it with strobe lights and plugged his camera into them. He took numerous shots from every angle, with and without the lights. Not once, but twice, he asked passing groups of people to stand next to the Boulder. He took numerous shots of each group. The DNR magazine published only one photo from the shoot. I asked him why he took so many photos. His answer, "it's cheaper to

use a lot of film than send the photographer back."

During one of the State's many financial crises, the DNR gave Bob the ax. He was close to retirement, but it didn't matter to the DNR. Bob struck me as a little too much of a free spirit to fit in with the DNR's bureaucracy.

Long before any of us met Bob, he spent some time in West Africa, teaching wildlife management. His cameras made the trip, too. His photos are absolutely amazing.

Someone told him a charging bull elephant wouldn't cross a ditch. Well. there is this amazing photo of this charging bull elephant that ah, thankfully, didn't cross the ditch!

Bob's birthdays were interesting. Most people prefer chocolate cake, or maybe spice, but with Bob, it was angel food. He ate half of the last birthday cake I baked him, Jody Bennett ate a third, and the rest of us got the crumbs.

Bob contributed a lot to the club bevond serving as Vice President for one year.

I'm glad to have been able to call Bob a friend.

Then there was his favorite question. "Emily, how come you always got the

ciggies?'

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
